Workers on Trak as Minister opens \$1m furniture factory

When officially opening Trak Furniture – Minda's new manufacturing outlet at Lonsdale, Minister for Family and Community Services, Senator Kay Patterson said that under the Commonwealth Government's **Tailored Assistance Program** to help develop and improve the business services \$115 000 has gone directly to Trak Furniture. This has helped to purchase much needed equipment for the factory.

Since the launch, Trak and its 27 employees have been very busy completing different work for many corporate customers and assisting its employees to continue to develop their skills.

Trak has also had a significant recent win with the Onkaparinga Council in regard to Waste Management. Trak was having trouble managing its sawdust and wood shavings due to the local windy conditions, and through modifying the process of using sawdust bins and diversifying the product range it has effectively solved the problem. This has been a fantastic achievement.

President's column

As I write this today the sun is streaming through my study window with another bright sunny day and wonder if this Indian summer we are experiencing will go on forever. Of course, (and for the sake of our beleaguered drought-ridden farmers, I hope not) and we will soon be feeling the cold and wet of winter.

Just as inevitable and as necessary as the change in the seasons, is change in an organisation. The world around us does not stand still, neither can we at Minda. We must adapt to a changing world and we ourselves must seek the kind of change which brings improvement. Significant in the last few years has been the much sharper focus on regulation and governance of organizations following the corporate collapse of companies like HIH and various 'dot com' companies. Legislative teeth have been sharpened and, not before time, Company Directors who have been derelict in their duties have been gaoled.

The Board of the Minda Association is deeply conscious of its governance responsibilities and conscientiously applies itself to further improving its role as the custodian of the people and assets of Minda. Part of its focus in this regard has been its review of the Rules of Minda because they form the heart of good governance, particularly in ensuring control remains with the Association through the Board. As you know, the Board has been engaged this task of review of the Rules for some time and after considerable consideration and debate is now in a position to put its recommended changes to the mid-year General Meeting of the Association to be held on 7 June. A letter has been sent giving an overview of proposed changes to the rules to all Association members and both myself and Phil Martin are available to answer any questions that arise. My mobile number is 0432 539 023, but please don't ring between 10pm and 7am! I urge all Association members to read the overview, attend the mid-year Association meeting and cast their vote on the Board's



recommendations, and by this means ensure their voice is heard.

On other issues before your Board, I will take this opportunity to give you a brief update.

- The Development application for Stage 2 of the Blackwood Park development is still with Mitcham Council and Minda staff are working through the issues with Council staff, hopefully towards a resolution in the near future. These things are never simple!
- Work on establishment of a long-term plan for the Brighton Campus is proceeding facilitated by an external organisation which has assisted other charitable organisation to formulate such plans. As I have said before, there will be an extensive process of consultation with stakeholders before this matter is brought before an Association General Meeting for ratification.
- Minda has purchased two properties at Blackwood to replace other properties which are no longer suitable for client use in line with our policy that sub-standard

properties be upgraded or replaced and that clients remain in an area with which they are familiar.

- Your Board continues to encourage consultation with Association members and in this regard the Reference Group has our support. I would like to record our appreciation to Lois Hoeper for her work as Chair on the occasion of her retirement from this role and congratulate Peter Krieg on his election to the role and look forward to working with him.

Finally, I had the opportunity to attend and take part in the Graduation and Certificate presentation to staff and clients, and once again was delighted to see the obvious joy and pride of the recipients and particularly the clients who participated for the first time. Once again, this ceremony reinforced Minda's well-deserved reputation as a Learning Organisation. I congratulate the staff of Learning and Development for their excellent and dedicated work.

Welcome to the Autumn edition of Minda News. I am pleased to be able to report some exciting developments since the last Minda News.

We have successfully completed most of the Commonwealth Government's requirements for disability services. One of the greatest challenges has been the development and independent acceptance of a wage assessment tool. This has been completed and now enables us to seek award coverage and better wages for our supported employees.

Also in the past three months we have been pleased to respond to requests from the State Government to expand some areas of our services:

- In early February we opened "Chuaninga" (an aboriginal word

meaning 'friends or mates'), a day option program program funded from 'Moving On' for up to an additional twenty young people with severe disabilities. This has been tremendously successful so far and it has been a pleasure to welcome these young adults to Minda's services and their families into the Association.

- In March we opened our new accommodation service for (initially) three teenagers with challenging behaviours. This is also in line with our response to unmet needs and is an exciting development.

We are presently in discussion with the State Government about the possibility of expanding respite services as part of the ongoing

support to families who have a son or daughter living at home.

We continue to implement our Strategic Plan and the 23 main business outcomes. I was recently able to share this update with the Minda Association Reference group and was pleased with positive comments on our direction and image.

I look forward to sharing this information with many of you at the mid year Association meeting on 7 June with a major focus on the work of the Board subcommittee on a review of the Rules of Minda.

Channel 9 Telethon



Minda has been fortunate to receive Level 1 sponsorship by Channel 9 Telethon this year. As part of the sponsorship two television commercials are made and at least \$50 000 worth of airtime is provided free of charge. Service Excellence Framework

Minda has been acknowledged as having achieved *FOUNDATION* level of the Department of Health *SERVICE EXCELLENCE FRAMEWORK*.

The Benchmark Certification validation took place on the 6th, 7th and 8th of December 2004. *SCOPE, Waterhouse, Respite Services and Building Abilities* were reviewed over a two-day period. The 39th Australian Society for the Study of Intellectual Disability Conference held in Adelaide, November 2004

Keynote speakers presented issues about client choice, funding for much needed services, more options of services including accommodation and day options, creative new ways of teaching and new learning environments for people with intellectual disability. The Conference was a burst of enthusiasm and recommended that all service providers should band together to provide better services for people with intellectual disability.

Kaye Kay presented a discussion paper titled *Assisting People with an Intellectual Disability to Cope with Change / Loss*.

Issues included what has been and is continuing to be done to assist people with intellectual disability to cope

with loss / change while living in supported accommodation. Historically there has been an incorrect assumption that people with a disability do not grieve.

Janet Videon presented a discussion paper titled *Identifying unmet needs of people with an Intellectual Disability from culturally diverse backgrounds*.

The paper discussed a *Cultural Awareness* project and recommendations which highlight that strategies need to be developed to identify unmet needs more effectively, to support people with intellectual disability and their families from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

Barbara Pennington, Vicky Waldren and Kellie Fitzgerald presented a

discussion paper titled *A Quality Service Model for people with an Intellectual Disability and complex behaviour support needs*.

Minda is reviewing its services for people with complex behaviour support needs. The behaviours often affect the person's ability to live a fulfilling life and Occupational Health and Safety issues arise for staff who provide day to day support, owing to the risk of injury related to aggression. This paper presented the results of a review and offers recommendations about the potential for improved service provision.

Minda receives first **Banana Keyboard** in South Australia

SoundHouse Music Alliance handed over the first Special Access Kit™ (also known as the Banana Keyboard, due to its bright yellow colour and bent shape) on International Day of dis-ABILITY. The music keyboard designed for people with physical and intellectual disabilities.

There are more than 100 of these keyboards around the world, but this was the first one in South Australia through a kind donation from Lewis Lodge of Brighton, Masonic Foundation and South West Masonic Trust.

Funds were raised through a variety of activities, including participation in the City-Bay Fun Run. Involvement in providing the Banana Keyboard for Minda is a typical example of the Free Masonry involvement in community projects in South Australia.

The banana-themed event was held in the newly completed *Isabel's* pergola area with the ribbon officially cut by John Lewis, Chief Executive of Australian Hotels Association (SA). AHA(SA) through their Hotel Care arm are also great supporters of Minda. Fellow guest, Eric Granger, General Manager, Mutual Community also joined us to celebrate

and used his influence to get the 919FM road crew out to help us enjoy the day. Entertainment was provided courtesy of Brighton Secondary School's Treble Choir directed by Anthony Hubmayer.

His Worshipful Master, Michael Mann made the official speech on behalf of fellow Lodge and Trust members, and Certificates of Appreciation were presented by Ian Thompson, Executive Manager, Client Services.

The keyboard will be used by the Lifestyle Services arm of Minda which provides day activities to 150 people with intellectual and multiple disabilities.

Blackwood Park wins prestigious award

The joint venture between Adelaide Development Company and Minda Incorporated, Blackwood Park was awarded the Best Residential Subdivision between 50 and 600 allotments at the Urban Development Institute of Australia (UDIA) awards ceremony. The judges said that "...the project had overcome significant engineering challenges and had set a new benchmark in Adelaide."

In keeping with its progressive policies, leadership in the field and pursuing new and innovative ways of enhancing services, Minda had moved to realise its Craighburn Farm asset through a joint venture residential development of part of Minda owned land at Craighburn Farm with Adelaide Development Company. Ian Marker, General Manager of Adelaide Development Company said "This award demonstrates the success of our partnership with Minda of which we are very proud. We have worked with Minda to make future provision for aged housing facilities for Minda clients, enabling them to continue to be part of the Blackwood community. The award demonstrates our commitment to respecting the natural environment within the Estate, while providing high levels of open space and strong design guidelines to ensure quality built form.

Minda Ambassador to Al Noor, Dubai



Kym Hancock, member of the Minda Board and Manager International Trading for Safcol Australia has been earning a reputation as Minda's overseas Ambassador.

On a recent trip to Dubai a work colleague asked Kym to talk to some sixty people (a mix of teachers and parents) at a training centre for children with special needs called *Al Noor*.

Established twenty years ago with eight pupils the centre now has approximately 220 and is run by a Board purely privately tendered by the UAE community. As most families are ex pats, the government does not subsidise apart from some assistance with donations from time to time. Parents came to the talk particularly interested as there is nothing like Minda available in Dubai offering ongoing care for children after schooling. *Al Noor* even had a pupil of 45 years!

Minda supporting the Aboriginal Disability Unit

Janet Videon, a Team Leader from Southern Metro Accommodation Services, completed a student placement project consisting of research and consultation with members of the Aboriginal Unit and Options Coordination. Usually information about services are presented in non-indigenous terms. The aim of the project was for information to be presented in a visual, Aboriginal-friendly format and be culturally sensitive. The outcome for the Aboriginal community is to have a better understanding of intellectual disability so that they may access services and support for themselves and / or a family member they care for.

"My placement with the Aboriginal Disability Unit has been both a privilege and invaluable. It has been a great time of learning and the sharing of knowledge, and gaining insight of Aboriginal People and their Culture. Options Coordination is a network of five agencies funded by the Disability



Services Office. They provide services to people with disability across South Australia. The Aboriginal Disability Unit is part of the Options Coordination service, and links Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People with the five Options Coordination Agencies.

The Aboriginal advisers support caseworkers from these services to work with Aboriginal people and understand Aboriginal culture. They also assist Aboriginal people to use Options Coordination Services and advise Options Coordination on how to improve services and do business in an Aboriginal way.

Risk Management at Minda

Risk Management is an essential element to good corporate governance at Minda. It is important that everyone at Minda becomes involved in the management of risk. A Risk Management process has been developed to register and monitor potential risks that may affect clients, employees, families and visitors using Minda facilities.

A working party was formed in 2004 to review our current Risk Management strategies and incorporate them into a new dRisk computer program. The dRisk program enables key staff to document potential risks then record the current 'controls' in place to minimise the risk.

An example may include the risk of a fire on Minda campus. The major 'controls' that Minda currently has in place would include

- Emergency Warden training for all staff
- the Pegasus system
- dedicated fire alarms to St Mary's Fire Station and regular testing programs

- Emergency Procedures 'notice board' in each cost centre
- Emergency and Evacuation policy and procedures
- Exit signage in buildings.

All employees at Minda are responsible for maintaining a safe environment.

If you would like to draw attention to any potential risks to people or property at Minda, please forward your suggestions to your cost centre manager who can send them to Judi Carpenter who is currently a Risk Administrator for the dRisk system.
